



Prairie Horizon Manchurian Alder *Alnus hirsuta* zones 4-7 height 25-30' width 20-30' full sun

A beautiful alder for difficult, dry situations. A rapid growing tree with decorative purple catkins and clusters of brown strobilus resembling little pine cones. Selected by the NDSU breeding program, Prairie Horizon® has proven to be the most drought tolerant alder in their trials. A good substitute for Aspen trees Alder leaves turn a rich yellow in the fall.



Silver Buffaloberry *Sheperdia argentea* zone 4-7

Pale Yellow flowers A tall, thorny, native shrub. Well adapted to dry, moderately alkaline and saline soils. Tolerates infertile soils, in part because of its ability to fix and assimilate atmospheric nitrogen. Berries used for jellies best after a frost. *Sheperdia argentea* has been used historically as a food, medicine, and dye. Grown as a back drop shrub, windbreak, wildlife (birds) and for its fruit.



Snowbird Hawthorn, *Crataegus x mordenensis* “Snowbird”

zone 4-7 height 10-20' spread of 10-20'. Double white flowers in late May,.

A small upright rounded tree with deeply lobed dark green glossy foliage with yellow fall color. A cloud of double white clusters of flowers in spring are followed by sparse red berries. Very cold hardy. Developed by Agriculture Canada at the Morden Research Station, originated as a seedling of 'Toba' hawthorn. Hardier than Toba. Tolerates some shade



Crimson Cloud Hawthorn *Crataegus laevigata* zone 4-7, height 20-25” spread 15—25’

The tree tolerates most soils, growing well in clay, but prefers heavy, dry loam. The main ornamental feature is red edged white flowers borne in spring which together give the tree a deep pink color. Fruits are red and quite showy but do not cover the tree. Crimson Cloud has been successfully grown in urban areas where air pollution, poor drainage, compacted soil, and/or drought are common. Flowers are fragrant. This Hawthorn is thorn-less.



Redmond Linden, *Tilia Americana* Redmond

zones 2-8, height 40 –50' spread 30-45'

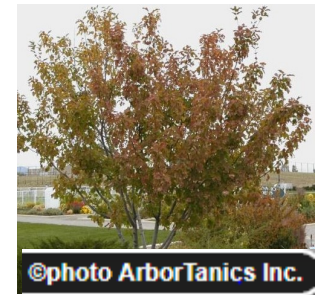
Pale yellow spicy fragrant flowers bloom in late June, this is a low maintenance shade tree that tolerates clay soil and some drought. Commonly called American basswood or American linden, is a medium to large deciduous tree with an ovate-rounded crown. It is native to a variety of habitats from Quebec to the southeastern corner of Manitoba and far eastern North Dakota south to Oklahoma. Trees are found in both dry upland areas as well as moist, low woods. When a tree is in full bloom, bees often visit in such abundant numbers that humming can be heard many feet from the tree. Honey made from the nectar of these flowers is a prized gourmet item. Flowers have also been used to make tea. Syrup can be made from the sweet tree sap.



Back by popular demand. Hot Wings Maple, *Acer tataricum*,

zone 4, height 15' spread 18'

A Plant Select tree. In spring, clusters of yellow-white flowers cover the tree after the leaves appear. Fall leaf color transforms from orange-red on the outside of the tree to yellow in the middle. HOT WINGS® also has strong branch unions making it less prone to storm breakage than other Tatarian maples. A Very Reliable Tree For Harsh Conditions! Showy red samaras (winged seeds) shine in bright contrast to the summer foliage of this small tree that is an excellent performer in rugged climates. Broadly oval when young, its branches spread wider than tall, becoming rounded at maturity. Hot Wings Maple has proven to be much more tolerant of

does best in average to evenly moist conditions, but will not tolerate standing water. It is not particular as to soil type or pH. It is highly tolerant of urban pollution and will even thrive in inner city environments. A compact fruit tree, the ideal size for backyard orchards; showy white flowers in spring followed by loads of bright red sour cherries in mid-summer, excellent for pies and jam; needs full sun and well-drained soil, self-pollinating; extremely hard. Bali Cherry is bathed in stunning clusters of fragrant white flowers along the branches in mid spring before the leaves. It has dark green foliage throughout the season. The pointy leaves turn an outstanding orange in the fall.



Hinnonmaki Red Gooseberry, *Ribes uva-crispa*

zone 3, height 3' spread 3'

Showy spring flowers with edible fruit, part shade to full sun with moderate water needs. A unique tart and sweet combination. Tart skin covers the sweet flesh of these tasty, ruby berries, so you can enjoy both flavors. Perfect for making pies and jams. Bushes are heavy producers, even when young. Mildew-resistant and cold-hardy. Ripens in July. Self-pollinating.





First Editions Candy Coralberry, *Symphoricarpos x doorenbosii* Candy
Zone 4-9 height 2.5' spread 3', Pink summer bloomer.

Candy™ Coralberry is great for anyone who is looking for a shrub that provides winter interest after most flowers and leaves are gone. Plump, candy-pink berries ripen in early fall as the last of summer's small pink flowers swell into pearls. As the leaves fall, each arching stem is adorned with decorative berries, which remain on slender branches through winter. The perfect plant for the winter garden, place Candy in a prominent place in the front border. Flowers bloom rosy pink in the summer. Fruit is not edible, but good winter food for birds.



Red Lake Current, *Ribes rubrum*

Zone 3-7 height 3-5' spread 3-5', part shade to full sun.
Yellow mid spring bloomer.

'Red Lake' is a red currant cultivar, it is a compact, mounding, deciduous shrub which grows 3-5' tall. Clusters of greenish-yellow flowers bloom in mid to late spring, and are noticeable but not particularly ornamental. Flowers give way to long, pendant clusters of bright red currants which ripen in July. Medium green leaves are 3-5 lobed, and are aromatic when crushed. Red currants, picked just after they turn red, are unsurpassed for jelly making and pies, may be eaten ripe off the shrub. Can also make an attractive ornamental hedge in the landscape. Introduced by the University of Minnesota in 1933.



Honeybelle Honeysuckle Vine, *Lonicera x First Editions* Honeybelle vine,
Zone 3-8, height 10-20', spread 5' recurrent bloomer, full sun

The first flush of flowers is like a waterfall of golden blossoms and the repeat bloom is extraordinarily consistent. Exceptionally hardy, withstanding temperatures to -39° F with no damage. This compact twining vine will bloom well into fall and produces some red berries. Although it will grow in semi-shaded areas, full sun ensures the best show of blooms. Easy to grow vine, adapts to most soil types, somewhat drought tolerant, prefers full sun.
