Dallodil Day Coffee Morning

The big days, the little days, cancer can take special moments away, but together on Daffodil Day, we take those moments back.

The Irish Cancer Society want Daffodil Day to be a reminder of the urgency to catch up on the detection of thousands of cancers remaining undiagnosed since the start of the pandemic.

It comes as an estimated 2,600 cancer diagnoses were missed in 2020 alone due to the Covid pandemic and catch up remains difficult due to demands on the health service.



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

A planning application has been submitted for a new school building for Coachford College. This new three story building will help the college to cater for over 1,000 pupils in the coming years.

Coachford College is one of the most successful colleges in the county as it caters for students from all over Mid Cork. The new building will take some time before it's complete but the submission of the planning application is a major and important first step. The new build will involve the demolition of the existing school buildings, the removal of existing pre-fabricated temporary accommodation and the construction of a new split level, part single storey, part two storey and part three storey 1000 pupil secondary school comprising a four classroom special education unit, a single storey multi purpose hall, general purpose room, general classrooms, specialist classrooms, social areas, library, administration areas, service yards, external stores, covered storage areas for construction studies, toilet and changing facilities and associated ancillary accommodation. The development also includes the provision of new site entrances, car parking area, drop-off areas, new site boundary, new ball courts, playing pitch, landscaped external areas and all associated site works.

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

Macroom Guides took part in the South West Regional International competition last weekend and won both the Senior and Junior sections.



NEW PROPOSALS TO THE RSE/SPHE

As you may know, it is being proposed that gender ideology be added to the school curriculum from primary school. This is a huge concern. There was recently an RSE/SPHE consultation that was done by https://ncca.ie/en/yet it wasn't communicated to schools or parents! Many parents only heard about it from various campaigns.

The Natural Women's Council (NWC), in partnership with LFJI, Irish Education Alliance (IEA) and Parents Rights Alliance campaigned against this through making parents aware and letter campaigns to schools. Other groups such as the Countess did stellar work. The NWC also organised an interview with Helen Joyce (best selling author of Trans) and Making Sense.

This Information evening is to inform Parents both primary and secondary school of the psychological consequences for children if these new proposals are brought into schools in September 2023.

Already there is inappropriate reading material in school libraries across the country that Childrens Books Ireland and the NCCA were recommending.

UNLESS LESS SLEEPLESSNESS

As a young boy it was a wonder to me that older people talked about not being able to sleep, or having a poor night's sleep, and being wrecked next day. I couldn't understand why they didn't do what we did. Did they not know that if you couldn't get to sleep all that was wrong was that the world was short of sleep, and we would have to go to the far side of the moon and bring back a bedload of sleep for everyone. It never failed.

There is another study published. This one from the University of Michigan, and it provides yet more evidence that lack of sleep may contribute to cognitive decline in older adults. The According to these researchers those who found it difficult to get to sleep in midlife on most nights had added the equivalent of 2.2 to 3.4 years of additional brain aging 14 years later.

This research was presented at a sleep conference in 2021. If like me you haven't heard about this before, we can wonder if the reporters who attended had nodded off.

The participants were 2595 adults. Their average age was 64 and 65%. They were studied firstly in 2002 and again in 2016. The results showed that 'frequent difficulty initiating sleep was associated with poorer episodic memory, executive function, language, visuoconstruction and processing speed'. The extent of decline led to the calculation of age equivalence of 2.2 to 3.4 years. That's an average of 2.8 years lost within 14 years, so they were declining at a pace of 20% faster than the norm. Note that we don't know from this study what happened during those 14 years. We may though be inclined to guess that the group who couldn't fall asleep most nights continued down that path. Perhaps though, it may not be a lack of sleep that produced the decline. Could it be depression instead? People who strongly want to get to sleep can get pretty annoyed with the world when they do not. Such states of mind are not good for us. Or perhaps some other medical conditions, such as vascular disease could have had a detrimental effect on those brains. However, these researchers have thought of those too. Those conditions did explain some of the difference - but only 12 to 20% related to depression, and 6 to 15% related to vascular disease.

This research did provide some encouraging news too. Those of you who sleep easily but wake up often during the night can relax. There was no correlation found with frequent awakening or with any other type of insomnia symptom and cognitive decline.

These scientists are advocating more research on circadian rhythms, as in another study, upset rhythms had been associated with a nearly twofold risk of cognitive impairment. If you think that you may have this problem your doctor can help. Treatments aim to reset your sleep-wake rhythm to align with your environment. Doctors may recommend healthy lifestyle changes,

maybe bright light therapy, or perhaps melatonin plo depending on the severity.

The lifestyle changes may include sticking to a regular meal schedule, a regular bedtime routine, a bedroom that is a cool quiet place, and a bedtime routine that includes relaxation from stress. Also avoid naps, take regular exercise but not close to bedtime, cut out caffeine after mid-afternoon, and alcohol and tobacco totally. Very important too is to manage your exposure to light. Make a habit of getting outside for a few minutes in morning light. It's a signal to the brain that the day has started, and dim lights at night an hour or more before bed, and avoid screens, or if you really must use them then ensure you use filters. It does sound like a lot of preparation, but then 3 years of avoidable decline may be just worth that effort.

If, however you have tried everything everywhere and nothing works for you, come join me on that trip to the moon. It is a long journey where nothing happens, there is no sound and there are no bumps in the vacuum of space. Sure, we can't be having the world running out of sleep, now can we, and there is always enough in a bedload of sleep for everyone, including us.

I suppose I must own up and let you know that our bingo and card playing startup on Wednesday 1st did not pass without a hitch or two. The mistake was from the start. This fella was given the job of calling out the numbers and not a clue had he what he was doing. Everything started precisely enough with a count to see if any of the balls were missing. Sure enough, having diagnosed that condition various attempts were made but he couldn't rectify it. Undaunted he continued. Let's say things went from bad to worse, not helped by his spilling the balls on the floor and calling some of them again and some not at all. Eventually to the relief of everyone, (particularly him) a panel was called, and an escape was made to the tea. Nonetheless, the more than a dozen there seemed to enjoy the hilarity of the spectacle of the guy trying not to be. We have a little problem in that the secretary is not in the position to issue the P45. As regards the card playing, wolves in sheep's clothing don't cut it, more like sharks masking as goldfish.

In other news, I was at the meeting of the clubs in Macroom on March 5th. What a brilliant idea that was. For those of you not there, and who don't know what I am talking about, it was a bit like the ploughing championships without the muck and without the ploughing or the rain, but with the stalls and with enthusiastic occupants encouraging us to join some fun filled local activity. It was well attended, and it is great to see so much going on. It was a good indicator of a healthy social community. Congratulations to the organisers.

We had a talk on 'energy measures' given by Breffni Lennon on Wednesday 22 February. This is part of a UCC / EU initiative. It was very interesting. If you have missed it, other ARAs in the locality will be having it too. I think it was twenty that was present, of whom thirteen gave their names to have a free energy assessment followed by a report on suggested cost-effective solutions.

We will have a talk on the developing scheme, Age Friendly homes, which aims to facilitate our loved ones staying in their own homes for as long as possible. This talk will be in the Heritage room, Kilmurry Museum at 2pm on the 8th of March. We will also have a talk some evening in March on herbal remedies. We will taste some of those remedies too. We will have ceramic art on either Monday or Tuesday evenings starting April, and we will have gardening and cookery demonstrations and beauty therapy and more besides, all this Spring term. Line dancing will be back Tuesday nights in Crookstown starting in May.

Aqua aerobics are on Wednesday mornings in Macroom 10am, and the bowls are on Monday mornings in Coachford 10.30am.

Staying Fit for the Future courses given by Cork Sports Partnership are running in Kilmurry at 7pm and in Crookstown at 5pm and again at 6pm. However, you can still contact me about how you may join the remainder of these sessions. If you have not done this course before it is well worth trying out. The remaining sessions will cost you €6 a session but this facility to join late will end shortly. If you would like to join us, our association is open to all, and now is a great time to join. You will get your membership fee at just twenty euro. Our philosophy is that age makes no difference, but health does. We try to do what we can to keep healthy and challenged in body and in mind, and together that is easier. The Macroom and District Environmental Group Think Globally, Act Locally HAZEL – MEDICINE PLANTS OF OUR HEDGEROW

Hi! Chris Barrett, speaking once again with our local Heritage Specialist, Ted Cook.

Readers will have learned from previous conversations with Ted much on the subject of Medicine Plants of our Hedgerow, particularly in relation to Hedgerows and the Law, their Functions and Benefits, Dog Rose, Willow and Holly.

These previous articles from Ted are all available through the on-lineLee Valley Outlook.

It is Hazel which is the subject Ted will share with us today.

It is particularly topical, as right now readers can spot the catkins which emerge through February into March.

Ted reminds us, with the accelerating bulldozing of Hedgerows, (which are Ireland's largest man-made monument), to reflect on the centrality to Ireland's early Forest Culture of

The Brehon Law Codes.

Miraculously, an original 8th Century manuscript entitled,

Comaithchesa' 'Breatha (Judgements of Neighbourhood), that deals with the various offences which a farmer is liable to commit against the 'seven Nobles of the Forest'; still survives intact within the Trinity College Dublin archives.

Hazel is listed as No.2 of the Seven Nobles'.

Legal commentary describes Hazel as 'in bringu feda' (Food provider of the Forest), reminding us that Hazel Nuts formed an important element in the Bronze, Iron and Early Christian Irish diet. That Hazel-nuts could be stored well for 2 years, made them a valuable foodstuff.

Ted reminds me that legends preserve and transmit wisdom. The Forest Fable of Finn McCool and the 'Salmon of Wisdom', at an esoteric level, alerts the generations to the nutrient value (Nutrare meaning



to nourish) of the 'Diviner of Hidden Wisdom', the ancient Irish name for our Hazel.

Finn McCool's druidic initiator Finnegas, in his lifelong search for the 'Salmon of Knowledge' that had ingested the Nine Hazelnuts of Wisdom, can hardly have known these facts about Hazelnuts.

Our Hazel, which is more of a shrub than a tree, is



pollinated by the wind. It's male flowers or catkins emerge from mid-February to the enormous relief of Bumble Bees, (nature's tankers of nectar), who arrive to gorge on it's protein-rich pollen.

You can scrutinize for the tiny arrestingly crimson female flowers on the same specimen at the 2 acre FOREST OF THE NOBLES which you can find between Macroom Golf club car-park and the Sullane River.

This was started in March 2014 and I believe it is well worth a visit to see how it is progressing. In fact, as I tell Ted, that is exactly what I will be doing very soon.

For now, I would like to sincerely thank Ted Cook for once again sharing his knowledge with us, and look forward to speaking with him in the future.





BUS: HISTORY AND MACROOM BY C. KELLEHER



History

It is 7.30 a.m., frosty, dark and dry; about fifteen well-wrapped people wait in the morning cold at Macroom Bus Station. The two 7.25 buses have left but the 7.40 (No. 40 Tralee Express) is quicker. Eighteen buses travel to Cork and back on weekdays and less at the weekends. Macroom to the Western Road, even in the morning rush, takes forty-five/fifty minutes. The drivers vary and are varied; the passenger-cast has many regulars; most are students or workers; most are guiet, and the 'talkers' can be heard by all. Sometimes the chatterers multi-task when texting and talking. The barrier rises but it is workmen arriving, in dribs and drabs; they are renovating the station building. Eventually the bus comes and we use our cards, phones and even money to access the bus's warmth and comfort.

One of the town's many advantages is its bus service. However, travel was not always as easy as 'hoppimg' on a bus. It has developed and varied over time. In succession, walking, horses via horseback, carts or carriages - trains and motor vehicles have dominated. Cork is the most frequent destination of people travelling from Macroom. The history of how Macrompians completed that and other journeys is fascinating.

From 1866, the train was the quickest and most efficient way to reach Cork. Goods transfer became much easier and faster, resulting in a boon to business. One reason Guinness was successful was its use of modern technology: first barges and then trains, for distributing its porter and stout. Others sectors benefitted too. The GAA and other sports organisations begun in the 1870s/1880s took advantage of railways to play matches far from home, and at a reasonable cost. One of the first GAA events was an athletic sports meeting held in Toames, Kilmichael in December, 1884. The presence of a train to Macroom, and a stop at nearby Dooniskey, was a necessity. Athletics, and not hurling or football, was the GAA's early focus. Train technology favoured the spread of 'recreational culture' in its many facets.

As well as transporting people and goods in peacetime, trains were also war machines. During the War of Independence they transported British forces and supplies. And so, trains became targets. Republican sympathisers transmitted information on troop movement and other military matters was via the railways: women, for example Cumann na mBan members, often played key roles and used ingenious methods to convey messages and sometimes guns.

As roads improved, cars and other road vehicle use increased; the greater mobility and range of cars and lorries proved irresistible. After all, Cork train-delivered goods bound for Inchigeela or Ballyvourney needed transport from Macroom to

there. Carts, cars or lorries were the only answer. With advances, road vehicles became more popular and railways went into decline resulting in the Macroom-Cork line closure in 1953. For local travel, the bus became a way to travel.

The word bus comes from the Latin word 'omnibus' (the dative plural form of 'omnis', meaning 'all') and literally means 'for all'. 'Bus' is defined as 'a motor vehicle for transporting large numbers of people along roads'. (It also has a second meaning as an 'electrical conductor or interface'. People, time, place, technology and circumstances interacted to create the modern bus as we know it.

As early as 1830s a steamed-powered bus operated in England (Hancock and Gurney); despite their advantages, high road tolls put paid to bus usage. This led to the use of horse-drawn buses - dearer, slower and harsher on roads. In the 1880s the Sieman brothers invented electric trolleybuses, powered by batteries connected by cables. These were suitable for city/large town routes only. Daimler produced a motorised bus that was first used in London on 23 April 1898; it had a maximum speed of 11.2 mph and a capacity of 20. Twelve years later, Frank Searle's designed double-decker entered service in London and was used in World War 1 activities. General Motors in America developed mass-production of buses and 'truck' there. The Routemaster was developed in the 1950s; it introduced many innovations; its features included using light-weight materials, power-steering, independent front suspension, and power-hydraulic breaks. The present-day bus is still based largely on this design.

In the meantime, 1925 legislation had amalgamated all Irish Free State railways as GSR (Great Southern Railways). The exceptions were railways that crossed the border, primarily the GNR (Great Northern Railway). GNR also decided to enter the bus business, starting in 1929. Their network was based around the northeast, and the first bus route was a Drogheda town service. But they also brought bus services to routes close to the rail line in north Dublin e.g. Howth, Malahide, Skerries. Gradually, the system expanded and incorporated more services.

The early vehicles were primitive, petrol-engined, mostly small, seating about 14 passengers, and with few passenger comforts, even having solid tyres. They came from a variety of suppliers and typically had quite short lives in service. The bus scene was chaotic, with little regulation and intense and often dangerous competition. Legislation in 1932 effectively eliminated competition and forced private operators to be taken over by the main companies. Dublin United Tramway Company (DUTC) had an effective monopoly by 1936 (Old Dublin Town website, downloaded 6

February, 2023). While buses and their subtypes (mini, shuttle, double-decker, trolley etc.) are used and modified for many purposes, it is in the area of public transport that the bus has come into its own.

Córas lompar Éireann (CIE) was formed in 1945, amalgamating the GSR and DUTC. By then, Cork had a fleet of buses covering the city and parts of the county. In 1958, GNR was absorbed, with CIE taking its city and provincial routes and 158 buses. Macroom Urban District Council passed a motion in September 1946 decrying the increased parcel charges of CIE. (Nationalist and Leinster Times, September 07, 1946). By 1947, CIE had substituted lorries to transport goods to Macroom. (Southern Star, 22 March, 1947). The newspaper writer looked forward to restoring trains, especially to service the town's important fairs. Alas, it was not to happen. The Lee Electrification Scheme, coupled with other factors, spelled the death knell of the Macroom-Cork line as part of it would be flooded. The last train left Macroom in 1953 amid much sadness. Lorries, cars and buses were now the only conveyances in operation.

The first reference to a Macroom bus I found was in a February 24, 1927 Cork Examiner advertisement which offered a first-class trip to Cork for 2/-; see picture. The bus left from William's Hotel (now the Castle). This was perhaps propitious, as when Dan Buckley, Killarney bought the same hotel (then Ronan's) he arrived in Macroom by bus, and with a suitcase and two greyhound dogs. Both Buckley's hotel and its dog enterprise have flourished since. The Castle Hotel continued as the Macroom busstop for many years until it moved to its current location, in the old railway station, in Railway View. Many families made great contributions as station masters, drivers and conductors to Macroom. One thinks of Tom Lenihan, Con O'Leary (Massytown), Michael Cahill, Charlie Leonard, Ted O'Leary, Peter O'Leary, Seán Twomey, Willie Sheehan, Jim Donova, Con O'Leary (Clondrohid), Patrick Twomey, Denis Dineen, Tom Fitzgerald and many others. (Apologies to those omitted.) Some went on to become inspectors.

Various historical incidents occurred on trains, trams, trolley-buses and buses. In 1913, Larkin's ITGWU members were locked-out by the DUTC, owned by William Martin Murphy, the leader of the owners/employers who were set to break Larkin, his ideas and his union. Larkin sought a right for workers to join his ITGWU union and a decent living wage. Many union members and workers were living in abject squalor in Dublin's notorious tenements. The workers were forced back to work but within a few years, the ITGWU had regained its power and numbers. Larkin's fellow union leader, James Connolly was driven to form the Irish Citizen

History

Rosa Parks' bus protest in Montgomery, Alabama on 1 December, 1955, led to her arrest for not complying with the state's bus segregation laws. Her 'crime' was to refuse to give her bus place to a white male. A bus boycott followed and the case led to the US Supreme Court overturning Alabama's Bus Segregation Laws – they were adjudged unconstitutional. And it proved a very important step in Martin Luther King's Civil Rights movement. (https://www.history.com/topics/ black-history/rosa-parks).

Donough O'Malley introduced free secondary education in 1967 and by 1970, secondary school numbers trebled. Significantly, he also introduced an associated school transport which enabled rural children to avail of the opportunity created (Seamas Ó Buachalla, 'Education Policy in The Twentieth Century' {Wolfhound Press, 1988}).

Danny Lynch was one of the first school-bus drivers in Macroom. Nowadays, not having access to a bus place is deemed an abuse of one's constitutional rights. Buses, sometimes modified, offer transport to centres of special education.

And so we come back to the cold morning in

Macroom. The bus duly arrives and we are on our way. The workers continue to roof the old historic building. Creating an inside waitingroom will be a major part of the restoration. But there is much room and CIE are apparently open to suggestions and ideas as to how best to use the rest of the building. People will have many and varied proposals. For me, Macroom badly needs a repository for old, invaluable artefacts of Macroom's history. Items such as John O'Reardan's original pantomime scripts, minute books of Macroom, Golf, GAA, and Bridge Clubs, of the ICA Guild, old photographs etc. need a proper 'home' where they will be preserved for posterity and available to the people of Macroom.

That morning on the bus, I got through two chapters and almost missed my stop in the Western Road. Macroom is a good place to live and our great bus service is another cherry on our cake.

IRISH MEP, BILLY KELLEHER, TO BE APPOINTED TO NEW EUROPEAN PARLIAMENT SUB-COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC HEALTH FOCUS MUST BE ON DELIVERING RESULTS BASED ON REAL EUROPEAN COOPERATION

Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher is set to be appointed to a new sub-committee in the European Parliament that will focus on the area of public health.

to 2018, I am acutely aware of the challenges Member States can face in delivering high-quality, timely health services to its citizens. "This new committee on Public Health can help shape the conversation at a European level while still respecting individual Member States' rights to decide

important, local health policy," concluded Kelleher.

Cork made it three wins from three in Division 1 Group A of the Allianz Hurling League at Páirc Uí Chaoimh. First-half goals from Shanes Kingston and Barrett give the home side a cushion and they led by seven points at half-time. Westmeath never gave up and had the gap down to five points by the 53rd minute but could not get closer and the result means that Cork need one more win from their remaining two games, at home to Wexford next week and away to Clare on March 19, to almost certainly ensure a place in the league semifinals.

Cork's first goal arrived in the third minute, Tommy O'Connell found Shane Kingston in space and the Douglas man finished well. Westmeath began to settle into the game and it was 1-9 to 0-6 after 25 minutes but Cork then had their second goal as Brian Hayes found Shane Barrett unmarked and the Blarney man drilled a shot to the net. It was 2-11 to 0-10 for Cork at half time.

Cork only added three points in the opening 15 minutes of the second half, and it was 2-15 to 0-15 with Conor Cahalane's third point, and Westmeath brought it back to five on 53, but the Midlanders needed a goal and Cork were not going to concede one as the game drifted on to its expected conclusion.

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


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
Welcome back dear student. "For day after day they seek Me out; they seem eager to know My ways, as if they were a nation that does what is right and has not forsaken the commands of its God. They ask Me for just decisions and seem eager for God to come near them. 'Why have we fasted,' they say, 'and You have not seen it? Why have we humbled ourselves, and You have not noticed?' (Isaiah 58:2-3) Last week we saw the importance of walking in unity and love towards one another and that, though many in the body of Christ fast and pray sincerely petitioning God for answers often we've fasted from food or drink when really it's anger, strife, bitterness or judging others that we should be fasting from to see meaningful transformation. God details what He considers a fast should be "Is not this the kind of fasting I have chosen: to loose the chains of injustice and untie the cords of the yoke, to set the oppressed free and break every yoke? Is it not to share your food with the hungry, and to provide the poor wanderer with shelter, when you see the naked, to clothe them, and not to turn away from your own flesh and blood?" (Isaiah 58:6-7) God turned their theories upside down, declaring He is more interested to see His character being demonstrated during fasting and prayer: beginning with a call to repentance! 'Repent' is viewed as a dirty word because sin is exalted as being good, and accountability is a 'no-no' in case it offends someone - but Judgement will come (Isaiah 5:20-23).

The Lord Jesus came home one time to find the house overflowing with people wanting to hear His Words and see Him heal the sick (Mark 2:1-12). Four men arrived afterwards, having carried their friend on a stretcher. He was paralysed and they wanted Jesus to heal him. Imagine how tired and sore they were from carrying his weight - their hands perhaps blistered, their shoulders aching. So they weren't going to go all the way home again just because the place was overcrowded. They climbed up on the flat roof making a hole in it, and lowered their crippled friend down right in front of Jesus! He wasn't upset; rather He admired their faith and perseverance. He looked at the paralysed man and said something most unusual "son, your sins are forgiven" (Mark 2:5). The zealous ones there were horrified – 'who did this fellow think He was: forgiving people's sins – only God could do that' they thought to themselves. Jesus called them out though proving that He had power to forgive sins (because of what He was about to do on the Cross). The result of this man receiving forgiveness was instant healing from what had crippled his body, and they were all astonished.

Do you remember the song 'Don't Leave Me This Way'? God loves us too much to leave us the way we were — lost in sin (Ephesians 2:1-5; Colossians 1:13-22). Isaiah chapter 58 concludes with the result of repentance, prayer and fasting – reaping a reward of healing, deliverance, joy, protection and prosperity; "Then your light will break forth like the dawn, and your healing will quickly appear; then your righteousness will go before you, and the Glory of the Lord will be your rear guard. Then you will call, and the Lord will answer; you will cry for help, and He will say: Here am I" (Isaiah 58:8-9). Hallelujah!



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
