Get to know our newest faculty member below

Dr. Ken Parnell is our newest Counseling Psychology faculty. Originally from Cupertino, CA, Dr. Parnell received his PhD in Counseling Psychology (APA accredited) from the University of Nebraska and he previously taught at the University of Kentucky. Dr. Parnell has specialized in couple therapy, assessment, and training issues. His primary research interests are in the areas of help-seeking, intimate relationships, and psychotherapy process and outcome research. He has lived in California, Colorado, Utah, Michigan, Maryland, Nebraska, Arizona, and Kentucky.

In an interview, Dr. Parnell shared what led him to pursue counseling psychology. He stated, "Like most of us I'm interested in people—what they think and feel, why they do what they do. In college I studied history and psychology and decided to pursue psychology in grad school because I felt the desire to serve others, and because I thought there would be more employment options. I chose Counseling Psychology because of the systemic, strengths-based approach."

While his graduate training and previous teaching experiences offered him the opportunity to travel throughout the United States, he always imagined he would return to Colorado to raise his family. The opportunity arose for him to return to Colorado, when our program began to search for a new faculty member. Dr. Parnell stated the program attracted him because it is, "strong; with clear organization, college support, good leadership, engaged students and staff, and a training clinic. In my (Dr. Parnell's) experience, it is rare to find all of these in one place." While at UNC, he has taught Sexuality Counseling over the summer and is currently teaching Diagnosis and Treatment Planning, Practicum in Individual Counseling, and Advanced Methods in Couple and Family Therapy at the Denver campus. In the Spring he plans to teach Practicum in Individual Counseling and Cognitive Assessment.

Campus Connections

Campus Connections is a therapeutic mentorship program that pairs UNC students with local community youth ages 11 through 18 years old. The program is aimed at providing social skill development, academic support, and career and academic planning for youth in Weld County. Campus Connections meets once per week as a course for undergraduate and graduate students who receive training in topics related to the issues facing the youth of the local Greeley community. Additionally, students are taught skills for working with youth, families, and utilizing community resources. After a few weeks of training, each mentor in the program is matched to a youth for a semester so that they may work together on developing and working toward goals for the youth.

A typical night of Campus Connections entails continued training for the mentors, followed by greeting the youth and touring different buildings on the UNC campus to provide exposure to university life. Youth and mentor pairs then work on academic and career goals, such as completing homework, exploring career options, or reading books checked out from the Campus Connections library. Next, mentor and youth pairs eat dinner with their Campus Connection "family," which is composed of a small group of other mentor-youth pairs. All food is provided by the Weld County food bank, which serves as a major resource providing hot meals to all of the youth in the program. After dinner, the youth choose two activities to engage in for the night. Activities are run by the mentors, with the help of their youth, and can include anything from karaoke to baking, to kickball, to Jeopardy. After engaging in activities, the night ends and mentors regroup to process events of the day and acknowledge the accomplishments that occurred that day.

The mentor experience in Campus Connections is unique, as it involves students connecting with one another as well as with youth and other community members. Mentors have the ability to interact with students from a wide array of academic programs, including undergraduate psychology, criminal justice, graduate psychology and counseling degree programs. Many students utilize Campus Connections as an opportunity to gain experience working with youth, connecting with the local community, and gaining further exposure to social justice issues. Mentors have also used their experiences in the program to help them specify their own career and academic interests.

Psych Services Clinic (PSC) Update

This semester, there are <u>11 practicum courses</u> and over <u>75 clinicians</u> enrolled!
The clinic has reached over 1,100 students and community members through outreach and psychoeducation presentations.

New this semester in the clinic:

- The clinic is currently working on marketing changes, including creating a new and unique PSC logo.
- Over the summer, the clinic moved to motion-activated recording in clinic rooms, adapted wording in paperwork to improve inclusivity, updated the clinic website (a huge thank you to Diane Knight!), and data collection in Titanium to track demographic information more easily.

Clinic Data Reports from Spring 2017

During the spring semester of 2017, the Psychological Services Clinic (PSC) at the University of Northern Colorado (UNC) provided services for a total of 144 clients and conducted approximately 825 sessions (individual counseling, child/adolescent counseling, play therapy, couples/family therapy, group counseling and psychological assessments). Below is a summary of information pertinent to our services at the PSC.

UNC Students and Northern Colorado Community Members:


- 39% were community members/non-UNC students
- 61% were UNC students


Gender Identification:
