

Access Guide to Cashtal yn Ard

Manx National Heritage has the guardianship of many ancient monuments in the landscape. A number of these sites are publicly accessible. Please note in most circumstances the land is not in the ownership of Manx National Heritage and visits are made at your own risk.

We recognise that visiting the Island's ancient monuments in the countryside can present difficulties for people with disabilities. We have prepared an access guide for visiting Cashtal yn Ard to help you plan your visit. This access guide does not contain personal opinions as to suitability for those with access needs, but aims to accurately describe the environment at the site.

Introduction

- Neolithic chambered long cairn (man-made stone mound)
- Approximately 5000 years old

The impressive standing stones visible today would once have been concealed within the cairn, but the smaller stones have been removed over time.

An entrance between the standing stones would have given access to the five chambers within. It is likely to have once been larger than the present site suggests and may have been linked with **Ballafayle Cairn** which is visible on the skyline to the north east. The site offers fantastic views of the surrounding countryside and, on a clear day, to the English coast.

Getting to Cashtal yn Ard

Grid reference - SC4623 8922

By car:

From Douglas: Journey time approximately 35 minutes. Drive north on the (A2) coast road towards Ramsey. At the Dhoon Glen, continue for 1km, then take the second right, signposted Port Cornaa and Cashtal yn Ard. Cross the tram tracks and take the next signposted right. When the road divides, take the left-hand fork through the ford and follow the narrow winding road for approximately 1 km. The road takes a sharp left turn with a cottage on the right. Two gates, one to a field and one signposted as a public footpath lie opposite the cottage, the footpath leads to Cashtal yn Ard.

From Ramsey: Journey time approximately 15 minutes. Drive south on the (A2) coast road towards Laxey. Turn left at the Hibernian onto the (A15) Hibernian Road and take the first right towards Ballaglass Glen. Pass the glen, continue around the sharp right-hand bend and up the steep narrow road until you reach a cottage on your left on a sharp left-hand bend. The public footpath to Cashtal Yn Ard is signposted on your right.

There is no bus route close to this site.

Access for Visitors

The road to Cashtal yn Ard is narrow and winding, with limited parking options.

Please do not block access to neighbouring fields.

There are no toilets or facilities at Cashtal yn Ard.

The site is accessed by a public footpath and cannot be viewed from the road.

Dogs are only permitted on leads.



The gate leading to the site is visible from road and signposted.



The path is narrow and uneven, the first section is enclosed by hedges



The path is approximately 300m long. It is narrow and winding, with uneven ground and loose stones. It is enclosed on both sides by tall hedges and slopes gently upwards. It opens onto a fielded area with trees, a ruined building and field gates. These fields may have livestock in them. Follow the stony pathway, keeping the hedge to your left, along the field edge. The pathway is rutted and uneven. The tall trees lie to the left of the site itself.

The site is accessed by either a large metal gate or a stone stile with a wooden rail at the top. The stones are somewhat uneven and could be slippery. There could be livestock in the field beyond – at the time of writing, there are three small, friendly ponies. The site can be viewed from the gate, but to access it, visitors must proceed approximately 30 metres beyond the stile/metal gate to the kissing gate.

The site itself is enclosed by walls and fencing. It is grassy and uneven, with protruding stones in places.

A visit to Cashtal yn Ard links well with further heritage locations in the area, such as **Ballafayle Cairn**, **Rhullick ny Quakeryn** and **Maughold Head Burial Cairn**.
