Yarpole Cash Point

Some people may be unaware of the ATM / Hole in the Wall / cash withdrawal facility that all Post Office counters offer.

With the Summer approaching and local fetes, fairs and craft sales perhaps accepting cash only, it is worth bearing in mind you can easily withdraw as much as you would like from your local PO counter in Yarpole.

Your bank will have set the limit for how much you may withdraw in cash each day - but it is usually between £250-£500 and we can easily facilitate these withdrawals here.

As we become more cashless in our day to day shopping, having some cash for car parks is also increasingly valuable - and we can easily issue coins as well as notes if that is your preference.

You can also check your balance and deposit both cash and cheques at the PO counter which may well save you a drive to your nearest open bank (if you can find one).

YARPOLE EDUCATIONAL TRUST



Any young person aged less than 25 years and living in the ancient parish of Yarpole (Yarpole, Bircher, Bircher Common, Croft, Bicton) may apply to the charitable trust for a grant.

The trust may assist eligible candidates with fees and costs associated with secondary and tertiary education as well as with initial professional training. Support can be given towards a wide variety of needs such as:

- * tuition fees
- * tools & equipment
- * course books & software
- * costs toward school/college trips or independent travel of an educational nature.

The trustees meet three or four times a year to consider applications. Applications should be received three months before the grant is needed, although urgent cases will be considered.

An extraordinary meeting of the Parish Council was held at the Parish Hall on Tuesday 2 May 2023 to discuss the Community Meadow. To progress plans more quickly, it was agreed to delegate responsibility to the Clerk, in conjunction with the Community Field Working Group (Cllrs Bott, Daniels, Middleton and Praill), to complete elements of the project without further recourse to the Parish Council.

On stripping the chameleon

I like the idea of chameleons – clever lizardy things that allegedly blush camouflage green when they are tongue-lassoing bugs in a bush, or come over all dusty beige when they are skulking in a sandpit (look out toddlers!) or exude an apeeling (sorry) oranginess when they are snoozing in a basket of satsumas. (I cannot help but wonder what a chameleon would make of my granny's rose print patchwork quilt - but that is an experiment for another day when I can catch one.) My point is that they adapt to the environment in which they find themselves and survive because of it. Unless you are hoping to be rescued by mountain rescue being an orange lizard, (or even a pink skink) in the snow is a high-risk strategy. Blending in is much safer.

We do it too. Not literally but socially. Most of us adapt our behaviour, language and the image that we present to the world so that we fit in with those around us or with their perceptions of us. Sometimes it is about what we look like and what we own, sometimes it is about how we talk, sometimes it is about keeping our real opinions quiet to avoid the disapproval of others. The Church has been blending in to not upset the world for decades and is at risk of blurring into the social wallpaper as a result and look at all the "shy Conservatives" in elections over the last ten or 15 years or the lifelong Christians who don't even tell their best friends that they love Jesus. Sometimes we join in with things we don't enjoy in order to blend in. And mostly we know when we are doing it and remain essentially ourselves.

But what if the normally khaki chameleon is made to live its whole life in a purple box and forced against its nature to be forever aubergine? For some people the pressure to be a certain way is like that. It is true captivity, even oppression, when people live their whole lives to fulfil other people's expectations and it can result in serious health and social problems.

If you are someone who lives as a captive chameleon in thrall to someone else or to society, history or a set of circumstances have a go at asking God for courage to be yourself. Read Psalm 139 and see how well God knows the real you and how he wants you to live your life in all the fullness he created you for. There is only one opinion that matters. His.

And for all you brilliantly well-adjusted geckos out there the real question is how we deal with the different, the difficult and the desperate. The answer, of course, is with love.

The Yarpole website is dead, long live the website!

The Yarpole website (www.yarpole.com) was hacked round about the 20th April. Quite how it was hacked, either through the website or via the server, is unclear. Nor does there seem to have been any purpose in the hacking; other than to render the website unusable. Google searches show the website captions in Chinese. Clicking on any link from the old website will bring up a page saying that the website is temporarily unavailable.

The simplest option was to start again with a new website. The new Yarpole website is now live at https://yarpole.org/. With the help of several contributors the website is now up to date in content. The first attempt used a dummy website from my home computer that was 2 months out of date as I had been away for the previous 6 weeks. However, Yarpole is again live and has all the same functionality as before.

A consequence is that some of the previous emails will not continue to work. The email for the Parishioner will become newsletter@yarpole.org. The email for the events mailing list will become events@yarpole.org.

As more people discover the website it will move up the search rankings. It is currently usually found at the bottom of the first search page or on subsequent pages. As www.yarpole.com becomes more defunct the old search pages will too start to disappear. Gradually Yarpole.org will replace the old website and will return to the top of the search rankings.

A further factor to consider is that there will be costs incurred by the new website; up till now these have been covered. The website will need to find about £50.00 a year to cover the costs of the domain name and the cost of hosting. How can the website earn money? Any suggestions would be welcome.

Hello everyone. Welcome to another edition of 'Lisa's Book Nook'. Did you know that June is Rose Month? Neither did I. You learn something new every day, don't you? In honour of this celebration of one of Britain's most beloved flowers, I am going to recommend some books that have the word "rose", or some other form of it, in the title. I hope you enjoy my selections.

A Court of Thorns and Roses by Sarah J. Maas

This is the first book in a popular young-adult fantasy series. Set in a world populated by humans and faerie folk, it is a Beauty and the Beast retelling of sorts, and is just as magical as the fairytale which inspired it. It is incredibly well written, with engaging characters and strong world building, and despite the target readership being young adults, there is more than enough going on here to keep adults entertained as well. Some parts of it are also downright dark and sinister, so it is definitely not a book for children. As someone who has largely outgrown the young-adult genre, the fact I am recommending this to you should highlight just how worthwhile this book is. Try it for yourself and find out.

Alchemy and Rose by Sarah Maine

Taking place in 19th century New Zealand, Australia and Scotland, this tells the story of Will and Rose, who are thrown together after he saves her from drowning following the sinking of a New Zealand-bound ship she was a passenger on. Both of them have fled troubled pasts and it's not long before a misunderstanding sees Rose on the run with a dangerous man called Robbie, with Will in hot pursuit. Despite being marketed as having a strong romantic element, which is does, this book offers so much more than that. It is compulsively readable, with well-drawn characters and a strong sense of time and place. It also covers a period of history rarely written about in fiction, that of the New Zealand Gold Rush of the nineteenth century. If you are looking for a fun, entertaining read, and maybe to learn a few things along the way, please pick up this book. You will be glad you did.

Rose of Sarajevo by Ayse Kulin

Originally written and published in Turkish, this moving yet heartwarming novel is set during the Yugoslav Wars of the late 1980s and early 1990s. The author has clearly done plenty of research into the subject, so much so the first half of the book can feel a bit like a history textbook at times, but the payoff is worth it as it really does feel like you are there in the former Yugoslavia alongside the characters. Some parts of it are quite hard to read due to the numerous atrocities that took place, and it can be a bit slow paced on occasion, but if you want a book that is thought provoking, educational and ultimately very rewarding, there are worse things you could do than check this out.

Blood and Roses:

The Paston Family and the Wars of the Roses by Helen Castor

The only non-fiction offering of my selections this month, this takes you on an amazing journey into the lives of the Norfolk based Paston family as they rise from rags to riches and back again during the Wars of the Roses. Told through actual letters written by members of the family, this is a scholarly, historically rich work that still manages to be accessible and thoroughly enjoyable. Helen Castor is an excellent medieval historian and her words and analysis, coupled with those of the Paston family, provide an intimate glimpse into this most intriguing of families, living through a tumultuous and deeply troubled period of history.

THE CURIOUS GARDENER <u>An unwelcome surprise</u>

A tree that we have been watching, nurturing and encouraging for five years has given us a big surprise. I'm a sucker for surprises, but this is one I could have done without.

We first saw Tetradium danielliae (sometimes listed as Euodia) in a small garden that was opening for charity. It was September, and in the centre of the little front garden a very handsome small tree was growing. The foliage was fresh green in spite of the lateness of the season, and the tree was a very pretty shape. What was most striking, though, was that this tree was covered in clusters of white blossom in autumn, when virtually all trees have finished flowering. The garden owner told us the name, we wrote it down, and I carried the scrap of paper in my handbag for years hoping to find one for sale.

Eventually, some ten years after that encounter, we spotted one in a local nursery. It was rather small and a bit misshapen, but we snapped it up because we'd waited so long and we might never get another chance. Peter dug one of his best planting holes and constructed a big cage round it to stop the sheep eating it. It looked a bit silly, this tiny smudge of a plant inside the huge construction, but we poured love into this little tree, urging it on and encouraging it into shape. Now, five years on, it has come into flower. So why aren't we celebrating? Because it shouldn't be flowering now – it should be in flower in September. And now we realise that for five years we've been nurturing a cuckoo in our nest. This isn't a Tetradium: it's a Phellodendron, a closely-related species that we wouldn't have knowingly planted in a month of Sundays.

Will we dig it up? Probably not, after all this time and effort. As Rabbit said when Pooh got stuck in his hole, "having got so far, it seems a pity to waste it." But at the moment the disappointment stings.

Just so long as I'm plugged in I can carry on doing this for month after ...


